



Centennial project update

State Significant Development Projects

Centennial is progressing with mine and infrastructure designs, as well as environmental assessments for three State Significant Development Projects; Mandalong Mine – Mandalong Southern Extension Project, the Newstan Colliery Extension of Mining Project and the Northern Coal Services – Coal Logistics Project.

A range of studies over the coming months will be completed to form part of the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for each project, and once prepared, will be submitted to the NSW Department of Planning and Infrastructure. Centennial will continue to consult with all relevant stakeholders.

Newstan

Newstan submitted an Environmental Assessment to the NSW Department of Planning and Infrastructure in early September seeking approval to allow the receipt of an additional 2 million tonnes per annum of coal from Mandalong Mine.

If approved, there will be no actual increase in the

total volume of coal handled at Newstan. The Environmental Assessment can be viewed on Centennial's website (www.centennialcoal.com.au).

Manning

Manning has submitted a response to the submissions received during the public exhibition of its Environmental Assessment, which is seeking approval for an extension in the Manning Colliery mining areas within the Fassifern Coal Seam.

The Response to Submissions addresses the concerns or issues raised by members of the community or government agencies in regards to the Environmental Assessment.
