



Project update

Angus Place and Springvale Mines – Extension Projects

The Environmental Impact Statements (EIS) for both projects is nearing completion. Centennial Coal has recently undertaken a series of community information sessions to share the findings of the specialist consultant's studies.

Community information sessions were held over two days at the Wallerawang CWA Hall and a more in-depth technical session was held at the Western Mines Rescue Station on Saturday, 12 October. The aim of these sessions was to provide the community with an opportunity to understand the mine design process, environmental conditions and how environmental management is undertaken. Centennial seeks to maximise resource recovery while reducing any potential for adverse environmental and social impacts associated with mining.

Key areas of discussion included:

- How the mine has been designed to avoid and minimise impacts on surface features including cliffs and pagodas.
- The geology of the area and how potential impacts on the ground and surface water will be minimised.

Participants who attended the session at the Mines Rescue Station were also given the opportunity to experience underground mining in the virtual reality simulator. Once the EIS is submitted to the Department of Planning and Infrastructure it will be placed on public exhibition for interested community members to review and make submissions regarding both projects.

Airly Mine Extension Project

The first of three community information sessions was held on Sunday, 13 October.

Approximately 60 people attended the session which was held at Airly Mine to hear presentations on the proposed mine design, findings of the subsidence impact assessment and the ground and surface water impact assessment.

Specialist consultants from Golder Associates and GHD presented the findings of their research and took questions posed by the community.

Key areas of discussion included:

- The impact of subsidence on ground and surface water within the Project Application Area and surrounding properties
- The stability of the mine workings post mining and the long term impact of subsidence
- Water in-flow into mine workings post mining and the impact on the surrounding catchment
- The use of water on site and the impact on the surrounding catchment.

The presentations will be made available on Centennial's website and information relating to the Airly Mine Extension Project will be displayed at Airly Mine.

Topics to be covered at the second and third community information sessions will include biodiversity, cultural heritage, aquatic ecology, visual assessment, air quality, noise and rehabilitation. The community will be notified of the dates and times for the remaining two community information sessions shortly.
