The Inglenook Community Consultative Committee (CCC) recently met at Centennial's Inglenook project office at Spring Park.

Information was provided to CCC members regarding the Inglenook Projects' exploration activities, including an update on the aeromagnetic survey, exploration status and drilling.

The aeromagnetic survey provided the Inglenook Project Team information on the distribution and thickness of basalt and the location of igneous intrusions such as sills and dykes. The survey also confirmed the presence of known volcanic plugs and indicated where others may exist.

The data collected from the aeromagnetic survey is used to inform the planning for future exploration activities.

Other exploration topics discussed included the status and ongoing strategy for the exploration drilling program.

To date, drilling has been undertaken at 15 sites with drilling an additional 50 sites proposed.

Drilling activities will re-commence later this month when the drill rig is re-located from Airly.

The CCC was also provided with a regional update on the coal industry by Centennial's Regional Projects & Technical Support Manager, Greg Banning.

100 years of local football

Originally known as the Blayney Citizens Cup, the Centennial Coal Cup (as it is now known) is celebrating 100 years of local football.

With another season well underway, Centennial Coal has proudly supported the Cup since 2008.

An iconic feature of the Cup is the presentation to each year's winners of the original 1913 silver trophy.

While the competition was originally a Rugby Union tournament, the competition changed to Rugby League after World War II.

Today, the competition has grown to include 200 members with eight Clubs currently competing. The long standing Clubs include the Lithgow Bears, Kandos Waratahs, Wallerawang Warriors and Portland Colts.

"The Centennial Coal Cup has moved beyond just a football competition and has become a key part in local sporting legacy."

"This legacy is thanks to the local players who train and play for the love of the game, as they are not paid professionals, and also to the coaching and support crews who volunteer their time to keep the teams together and performing at a high level," said Centennial's Fiona Van Der Velden.
